OUR CHARITY PROFILE

Waltham Forest Community Hub will be 15 years old in December 2020. The charity was born on 1st Dec 2005 and underwent name change and re-branding in July 2015. We are a registered charity and company limited by guarantee. Our home is in a 19th Century locally listed former school building, set in a conservation area. Our primary purpose is to provide and facilitate development and support services for the local community, in particular services for young people and senior citizens. A board that consists of committed trustees manages Waltham Forest Community Hub.

Our building is used for community development and engagement activities and is available for public hall hire to help secure much needed revenue. We provide responsive services for the local community and are committed to developing cohesive communities and our services are available to all. Through our partners we are able to offer diverse services to Waltham Forest diverse communities that respond to local development and deprivation data and national development trends.

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TRUSTEES REPORT

In each year of Waltham Forest Community Hub's short history, we've seen a remarkable increase in demand for the charity's services. Although the last financial year ended under extremely challenging circumstances with COVID-19 affecting all our activities, we managed to engage more than 300 young people through youth activities and more than 150 older people through weekly activities and events, prior to the start of the pandemic. 12 different community groups used our venue on a regular basis, which meant fully utilising a community space by keeping it open 7 days a week with community activities. We know that we're needed and also, more importantly, that we fulfil our mission by making a huge difference. Whilst we can't change the impact of social factors that are faced by many disadvantaged groups, we can have a positive impact on a person's sense of self-worth and confidence. Knowing there's a huge need for our service and that we make a demonstrable difference to countless lives, our biggest challenge remains to ensure we're here in the future. A grant from the Youth Investment Fund and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, has been instrumental in helping us to grow our youth activities in Waltham Forest. In 2019 we produced a five-year Strategic Plan. We remain confident we can continue to attract growing support from corporate sponsors and the grant funders who've made our success possible thus far. We're hugely grateful to every one of our funders and donors.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT



We recognise the barriers that divide us and to address this we have developed innovative ways to encourage and support community cohesion by bringing people from all walks of life together. We do this in an inclusive way through events, projects that tackle isolation and bridge gaps between generations, joint trips, Christmas Lunch and cultural celebrations.

Our organisation's aim has been to deliver projects and activities that meet the following four areas of need:

- Providing community resources
- Engaging and empowering youth
- Promoting community cohesion
- Improving our space

We met our charity's aims and objectives by delivering services of a high standard, which we were able to sustain for the medium term. Not only were we supported by a strong team of staff and volunteers, but also the local business community who have been instrumental in enabling us to successfully deliver many community events. To support Waltham Forest's year as the first Borough of Culture in 2019, we delivered the Walthamstow Village Festival with overwhelming support from our local business community. Our Pensioners Christmas Lunch was a great reflection of what a cohesive community can achieve, as young people and businesses came together and supported the event. The result was an amazing achievement on a shoestring budget. This common cause brought local people together and helped to bridge the gap between generations. We owe our success to the enthusiasm, commitment and great teamwork between trustees, staff and volunteers.

ENGAGING AND EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE

We engaged 300 young people aged 11-19 by offering open access Youth Clubs three evenings a week in two areas of Walthamstow and offering one to one mentoring and volunteering opportunities. We were able to introduce employability support through more formalised social action projects funded by London Youth – followed by Youth Investment Funding from the National Lottery and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport. Over 30 young people were inspired to realise their potential and contribute positively to the community they live in, through our support. Volunteering at our events; Dignity Day, St Georges Day, Village Festival, 5K Rough Runner Fundraiser, Theatre Shows and Christmas Lunch, enabled over 60 young people to improve their employability and build self-confidence to achieve social independence. They not only run a successful campaign to raise awareness of homelessness, they also held several stalls at events and supported two local homeless charities. The young people managed to get a grant to deliver a mental health awareness event on 8th February 2020. The community event was organised by the young people and it took place at Langthorne Park Pavillion in Leytonstone.

YOUTH EMPLOYABILITY OFFICER HAMZA ABDULWAHI'S PERSPECTIVE

“I have been the Youth Employability Officer at the Community Hub since September 2019 and I have had 83 one to one sessions with 32 young people who accessed our employability support service. Whilst supporting 19 young people with interviews and helping 14 to get into employment, has made me realise the sheer extend of the support required, especially for those aged 17-24. My passion and experience in youth work comes from my own lived experience. I was a regular Youth Club visitor for many years while I was young. I then transitioned into a Youth Worker within the community I grew up in and that has not been a bad thing as it has given me an upper hand in understanding local issues that young people face because I was one of them once. I am a living example of how Youth Clubs can have a positive impact on communities. My cultural heritage and upbringing as a Somali who has walked the path that many young Somali boys are walking, gives me an added advantage in reaching out and engaging underrepresented groups within my community.

I have found lack of employment opportunities to be a huge problem in our borough. Coming from a disadvantaged background meant I was able to slip through the gaps within the education system. This happens a lot more than it is reported or acknowledged. It ranges from young people not having the correct identification documents to not meeting requirements academically. The education system is not designed for everybody. When I offer employability support, I cater for each individual after assessing their needs and setting realistic tangible goals. I enjoy taking young people through that journey by empowering them to see their true potential and not setting limits/barriers for themselves. I take a holistic approach and my employability sessions involve understanding their experience, looking at what works, what doesn't and being realistic about what can be achieved. This helps to build resilience when it comes to job searching because sometimes we may not get the results we want after a lot of hard work and developing resilience helps.”



PROMOTING COMMUNITY COHESION



Our Seniors' Club which originally started in January 2015, has gone from strength to strength over the last three years, with Sandra's co-ordination and Lyn's support. All credit goes to the staff and volunteers like Tommy, Danielle, Steve and Sue – the success of this project is down to their sheer commitment, support and co-ordination of all activities. We welcome senior citizens aged 55 + from across the whole borough and our numbers have increased five-fold, with our membership now sitting at 67 members.

We offer a weekly lunch and social club to reduce loneliness and isolation, which is attended by 30-40 members. Our regular volunteers help us serve a two-course lunch. For some this is the only home cooked meal they get all week. We offer activities such as bingo; crafts; singing and talks from external agencies/speakers. We also started a seniors' choir that performs at a variety of our events.

In February 2019 we held a Dignity Day, and in April we celebrated St George's Day with a traditional meal.

In 2019, we organised two trips to Hastings and Brighton which attracted around 50 seniors to each.

WALTHAMSTOW VILLAGE FESTIVAL – BOROUGH OF CULTURE 2019 EVENT

We were hoping to take a break in 2019, but after Waltham Forest was chosen as London's first ever Borough of Culture in 2019, it became important to our close-knit community to make the Village Festival one to remember. We had so many local organisations co-produce different elements of the Festival. Henry Maynard School organised a Procession with their Year 3 and 4 students for the opening of the Festival and we held auditions at Walthamstow School for Girls to select young performers for our Stage. Both schools' Music departments worked really hard. We are extremely grateful for the passion and commitment shown by Helen Bradshaw and Roxanna Kabra. Our Stage and Music Production Manager, Sandra Jerome, had a mammoth task on her hands as she had 28 Acts, spread over three different stages. We had a very good turnout, even though this year's Festival was on the same day as the London Pride event.

As a Charity we want to be known for shifting the cultural context, one that not only believes in what we do but also demonstrates and supports the amplification of community organisations in the borough that do wonderful work. This year we had the presence of 22 community groups who held stalls including two schools and 3 different Choir Groups from different parts of the borough. As we aim to engage and empower young people in everything we do, we had 18 young people volunteering and supporting from set up, to campaigning to raising awareness of 'Homelessness' to cleaning up at the end of the Festival. We believe in providing a platform for young people to showcase their talent as we know it goes a long way to increasing their confidence, 12 local young people performed on stage. We were fortunate to have the support of many businesses on Orford Road. Our relationship with local businesses is ongoing and not one that ended with the Festival. We are incredibly proud of the support we had from 40 people who were involved in setting up and running of the entire Festival.

The history of the Village Festival in the 90s (when it got too big) has deterred us from making it too big, especially as the Village is a small area and we want the Festival to be something for local people to look forward to and not dread. Our charity is in the heart of the Village and it naturally felt like we should take the lead in co-ordinating it, but we didn't expect it to be as successful as it has been. Credit goes to the Festival Team, which includes everyone who has contributed in one way or another. The Team has really grown over the last 5 years, from the initial 3/4 people when it was revived in 2014.



FUNDRAISING



MACMILLAN CANCER SUPPORT FUNDRAISER



Some of our volunteers helped us to run a Coffee Morning to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support. We raised a whopping £385 all thanks to our local community who are always happy to support such a wonderful cause.

CHOIRFEST 2019

We have a strong tradition of community singing in Waltham Forest. Hundreds of residents benefit from the sociability, fun and feeling of well-being that comes from singing in a choir. The Choirfest brought together 13 choirs from across the borough for a two week festival starting with a World Peace Day event by Natural Voices on 21st September, culminating in a mass performance featuring around 300 singers at the Walthamstow Assembly Hall on 5th Oct . A selection of community choirs delivered events and performances on the theme of 'Fellowship' to celebrate our year as London Borough of Culture 2019. This was a unique initiative that brought together 11 choirs; a musical theatre group and a Ukulele group! Our Trustee, Margaret Sobiech and our Operations Manager, Sandra Jerome, helped to co-ordinate this wonderful collaboration.



XMAS MARKET AND STARLIGHTERS

Our Operations Manager Sandra ventured into organising a Christmas Market for the first time. Although the breezy and chilly weather was a major challenge, it turned out to be a lovely family friendly community event. Starlighters put on two shows a year for our senior citizens to encourage them out of their homes and into the community. With funding from the Hoe Street Ward, in 2019 Starlighters were able to offer 190 free tickets to older people from all over the borough, across two shows including a pantomime in January 2020.

A STARLIGHTER'S PERSPECTIVE



Starlighters was formed in 1980 to raise money for local charities and other good causes. We were delighted to be asked in 2017 by WF Community Hub to put on a pantomime for local senior citizens. We loved the atmosphere, and we were so warmly welcomed that we haven't left, and I now work there! Since 2017, we have put on 8 shows and raised over £4000 for WF Community Hub. The staff team and volunteers do an amazing job and have become our Front of House Team. It is fantastic that we are able to use our love of performing to give something back to the Community.

A STARLIGHTER'S PERSPECTIVE



Starlighters regularly perform; putting on plays with music and other shows such as pantomimes at the Community Hub to raise money for the charity. I also perform as a musical duo with my friend Steve and we play there occasionally when asked. It is an absolute pleasure doing something we enjoy at a place where we love playing. We played there on Christmas Day 2018 for senior citizens and also a year ago at the "seniors' luncheon function". These are to name two occasions where we were fed and watered. You could say that we sung for our supper! But we would have played there anyway as there is a lovely atmosphere at the Community Hub and some wonderful work is done there for good causes and local charities. Our Drama Group, "The Starlighters", well we all thoroughly enjoy performing there and there is some genuine talent in our group but we as a group, do not take ourselves too seriously which adds to the positivity of the shows we put on. The management do a brilliant job there and there are some more wonderful volunteers there apart from us who also do a great service to the Community Hub.

CHRISTMAS LUNCH

The charity first started the tradition of Christmas Lunches in 2015, following feedback from our service users, specifically those living in local sheltered housing accommodation. As soon as we realised the opportunity to tackle isolation within our community, the Youth Team injected innovation to this initiative by turning it into an inter-generational project that would not only engage older people, but also engage and empower young people and bridge the gap between the young and the old. This popular initiative has gone from strength to strength due to the sheer commitment of those who make it happen year after year. In 2019 the Christmas lunch took place on 21st December, with a donation from the Walthamstow Village Residents Association. Our local chef Shameem Mir from Shams Kitchen volunteered her time to cook for us. The young people volunteered their time to host tables, serve the lunch and interact with our seniors, which resulted in many of them wanting to come back and volunteer at other events to spend time with the seniors.



8TH MARCH – INTERNATIONAL WOMEN’S DAY

This was the first time our charity organised an International Women’s Day event to celebrate strong women who live and work in our borough and to champion empowerment. We were honoured to have the support of a fantastic line up of speakers, including Hibo Wardere, Carole Maloney, Jacqueline Hinds, Charlie Blair, Alison Manning and our charity Director Monwara Ali. Each speaker used the platform to make a huge impact on the audience through talks and a panel discussion on how men can empower the women in their lives. It was great to hear positive male perspectives from Ali Abas and Jason Hill who supported the Panel Discussion.

FUTURE PLANS

There has been a growing need for befriending services for older people as our venue is central to many sheltered housing accommodation and care homes.

We have developed a reputation for youth work and mentoring in Waltham Forest and have also led in collaboration to meet befriending needs identified during the pandemic. We are looking to work in partnership with other local voluntary sector organisations to support the managed care and support network and improve collaborative working between the Local Authority and the voluntary sector. We would like to replicate the excellent work we already do, in other areas of the borough, to promote social action

and empower young people to make a difference within their community. This will result in an increase in confidence levels and a reduction in isolation and depression amongst young people. Following another successful year of community activities and collaborative working, we are now looking ahead to develop and strengthen the connections we have made. We are planning services that will help to develop employability skills in young people and encourage social action to improve their life chances and thus make a real difference to the lives of our service users.

GLOBAL REVIEW

Waltham Forest Community Hub has been successful in raising external funds to run services. However, raising unrestricted income to cover core costs continues to be challenging due to the high maintenance and running costs of a locally listed building that needs upgrading.

We have introduced a few additional mechanisms to maximise income from the building by supporting activities within our Car Park, running regular events and delivering training to offset the high costs of running the building. We will continue to generate funding through diverse sources, such as trusts/foundations, commissioning, donations, venue hire income, events, etc, to maximise income generation. The Trustees have considered the reserves requirement for the charity and have agreed that our reserves level


should always remain equivalent to at least three to six month's running costs. When we went into lockdown in March 2020, we had to suspend all our activities and cancel bookings, which completely depleted our income from venue hire. During this difficult time, we have been extremely fortunate to receive emergency funding from the National Lottery to support the running costs of our charity and enable us to meet some of the urgent needs of vulnerable residents from our community.


